## QUARTERLY NEWSLETTER FOR DECEMBER 2023

From The Editor,

In an article published by the ABC on 25th October, recently retired scientist with the Australian Antarctic Division (AAD), Dana Bergstrom, has now been able to relate her experiences while working for the Division for more than 40 yrs. She relates that all public communications issued by the Division were “carefully calibrated, crafted and monitored” to ensure that their funding was not impacted.

Eventually, that calibration went beyond what she thought was justified, and in the interview, she said that she was “gagged”.

She is not alone. Ecologists and climate scientists have told the ABC of a widespread culture of suppression and self-censorship, and not just within the AAD. Thus, in the past, the truth regarding the causes and effects of climate change have not been made public.

We rely on evidence based science to direct our work as FoBNP in the Park.

## President's Report

2023 is drawing to a close: it has been a varied and eventful time for the Friends of Belair national Park.

The weather has shown us that it is variable and can throw unexpected events our way. In late June the car park near the Volunteer Centre was turned into a lake and walking tracks washed out by heavy rain; September brought high winds that blew over mature trees and disrupted power supplies.

The work of FoBNP volunteers continues. Our membership is strong and continues to slowly grow, but we need to "get our name" out there so more people are aware of our activities. There are many members who have recently joined and some who have been with us since the start.

FoBNP is continuing the work in Bushcare actively expanding the Vegetation Management Units (VMU) where invasive weeds are being reduced. Revegetation work in parts of the old Belair Golf Course is being continued using funds raised through Belair Hotel to purchase tube stock of local endemic plants. The establishment of bandicoot habitat areas near the Volunteer Centre has been undertaken involving children from Blackwood Kindergarten and Stirling Community Kindergarten. Further areas will be established in 2024. Thanks to Craig Boulderstone for his role as Bushcare coordinator and Barb and Peter Raine for their revegetation work.

An innovation in 2023 was the establishment of the "Emerging Environmental Steward" Award. Details are given in the June Newsletter. In 2024 the Award will again be given to recognise and encourage the involvement of young people in environmental issues.

### Where will FoBNP go in 2024?

We are volunteers and members of a strong and collaborative group. The skills and knowledge we have are varied and valued. No doubt our skills and knowledge will be extended and put to good use to continue the work we do, as well as venturing into new areas. The Strategic Action Plan 2023-2028 launched mid-year will guide our work. In the September issue of the Newsletter Mark Pedlar wrote

*"The new plan sets out a clear vision of "A connected community working together to conserve our Park's biodiversity and heritage." It presents four themes – bushcare, engagement, education and European history and heritage."*





## November : Prof Chis Daniels

As he does every year, Chris Daniels gave the Friends of Belair a wonderful, entertaining and very informative talk; this time on a very familiar local creature, the koala. Among the many things learnt was that koalas are "arboreal wombats" and wombats are "burrowing koalas" with those two marsupials being very closely related. Also that there are two sub-species of koalas with the northern one being smaller and greyer and our local southern one being browner and larger; that female koalas giving birth to their jelly bean sized infants sit in a special banana-shaped position to make the journey to their pouch as easy as possible; that Cleland had an extra thirty thousand plus visitors after singer Katy Perry cuddled a koala named Murray that she thought smelled "like a spa" and that koalas were worth 3.2 billion in trade and tourism in 2014. We also learned about the evolutionary and taxonomic placement of koalas and that they had gigantic relatives that are now extinct. We also learnt a lot about the complexities and issues created even by well-meaning people and about some of the interactions and sometimes misunderstandings that people have with and about them. A fascinating talk loved by all there and can't wait till Chris Daniels gives his annual talk next year.

## Myxomycetes in Belair National Park

Who says winter is cold, dull, wet and dreary? It provides the best conditions for the sighting of tiny myxomycetes (slime moulds). Like fungi, identification can be very difficult, and depends on physical features, stage of growth cycle, condition, spores etc. More significantly, their size makes them hard to see. A selection of myxomycetes observed during winter and spring are shown below. Photos are cropped to show detail but do not show scale, most of which have fruiting bodies barely 1.0 mm in diameter.
